Memorial Markers -

ANC preserves space specifically for memorializing individual service members whose remains are missing, never recovered, scattered, or buried at sea (Public Law 112-154).

There are currently 2,809 memorial headstones at ANC for these missing or never returned service members (380 spaces remain for future missing or lost).

Group Markers -

There are hundreds of group burial markers at Arlington National Cemetery, ranging in size.

However, it is important not to confuse a group burial with that of an Unknown. In a group burial, the individuals are known, but because of the circumstances of their deaths, they are individually unidentifiable. When this occurs, the DoD directs that all remains be interred together and a headstone be erected with each person's name and other data engraved upon it.

Memorial Arboretum and Horticulture –

Arlington National Cemetery boasts a large collection of memorial trees throughout its grounds. These trees serve as living monuments commemorating military units and battles, veterans, families, and others who serve.

Other than this large collection of trees, Arlington has few commemorative works that do not memorialize the individual service member. In total, there are 163 commemorative works – **142 being commemorative tree monuments***. Due to the dwindling capacity of the cemetery, these works have been more closely regulated in recent times – and only three have been placed within the last quarter of a century.

Other trees include: #1, American-Armenian Volunteers at Argonne; #2, American Defenders of Bataan and Corregidor; #3, Veterans of the Battle of the Bulge; #4, Beirut Victims of Terrorism; #5, U.S. Colored Troops and Freed Slaves...along with another 137 living monuments.

Commemorative works process IAW 38 USC §2409

Memorial areas. The Secretary may set aside a suitable area to honor the memory of those:

- Missing in action
- Remains not recovered
- Buried at sea
- Remains donated to science
- Ashes scattered without interment of any portion of the ashes







Except for a monument containing or marking remains, no monument may be placed except if the following criteria are met:

- The monument commemorates an individual, or individuals, whose memory is to be honored or a particular military event that occurred more than 25 years in the past
- The monument can be placed in an area not suitable for burial and the Commission of Fine Arts must be consulted regarding the design
- A non-governmental entity pays for 100% of costs and provides rationale for placement at ANC
- SecArmy must notify Congressional Oversight Committees (if approved) and must allow 60 days (for Congressional disapproval) before placement



Commemorative works at ANC

Process:

Request for monument placement ack

ANC notifies sponsor of requirements and acknowledges request

Sponsor submits required packet to ANC

ANC reviews packet for completeness

Requests submitted to ANC are required to contain:

- □ A clear articulation of the purpose of the monument
- A copy of the independent study required by law
- A copy of the architectural drawings
- Verification that the placement date is no less than 25 years following the last day of the service commemorated
- Indication that the construction, placement, and all supporting activities for the installation of the monument will be paid for and sustained in perpetuity from the sponsoring organization's privately-sourced funds. Certification of funds must be included.



Comparison of physical size


Existing commemorative tree monuments vs. proposed NASAA monument
